Mach-1 Financial Group, LLC is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as an investment adviser and, as such, we provide advisory services rather than brokerage services. Brokerage and investment advisory services and fees differ and it is important for you, our client, to understand the differences. Additionally, free and simple tools are available to research firms and financial professionals at Investor.gov/CRS, which also provides educational materials about broker-dealers, investment advisers, and investing. This document is a summary of the services and fees we offer to "retail" investors, which are natural persons who seek or receive services primarily for personal, family, or household purposes.

What investment services and advice can you provide me?

We offer the following investment advisory services to retail investors which includes financial planning, portfolio management, selection of other advisers, education seminars/workshops and asset allocation services. We are the sponsor of a wrap fee program of which we are also a manager. Account Monitoring: If you open an investment account with our firm, as part of our standard service we will monitor your investments on a weekly basis.

<u>Investment Authority:</u> We manage investment accounts on a **discretionary** basis whereby **we will decide** which investments to buy or sell for your account. We have discretion to select, retain or replace third-party managers to manage your accounts. You may limit our discretionary authority (for example, limiting the types of securities that can be purchased or sold for your account) by providing our firm with your restrictions and guidelines in writing.

Investment Offerings: We offer advice on the following types of investments or products: equity securities, certificates of deposit, municipal securities, mutual fund shares, United States government securities, options contracts on securities, money market funds, REITs and ETFs.

<u>Account Minimums and Requirements:</u> In general, we do not require a minimum dollar amount to open and maintain an advisory account; however, we have the right to terminate your account if it falls below a minimum size which, in our sole opinion, is too small to manage effectively.

What fees will I pay?

The following summarizes the principal fees and costs associated with engaging our firm for investment advisory services. For detailed information, refer to our Form ADV Part 2A and Form ADV Part 2 Appendix 1 Brochures by clicking this link adviserinfo.sec.gov/firm/summary/298195.

- Asset Based Fees Payable monthly in arrears. Since the fees we receive are asset-based (i.e. based on the
 value of your account), we have an incentive to increase your account value which creates a conflict especially for
 those accounts holding illiquid or hard-to-value assets;
- Wrap Program Fees Payable monthly in arrears, based on the average daily balance. Asset-based fees
 associated with a wrap fee program generally include most transaction costs and fees to a broker-dealer or bank
 that has custody of the assets; therefore, the asset-based fee is higher than a typical asset-based advisory fee.
 Since our firm pays the transaction costs associated with securities transactions in your account, we have an
 incentive to minimize the trading in your account.

Examples of the most common fees and costs applicable to our clients are:

- Custodian fees:

Other product-level fees associated with your investments

You will pay fees and costs whether you make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. Please make sure you understand what fees and costs you are paying.

Key Questions to Ask Your Financial Professional

 Help me understand how these fees and costs might affect my investments. If I give you \$10,000 to invest, how much will go to fees and costs, and how much will be invested for me?

What are your legal obligations to me when acting as my investment adviser? How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have?

When we act as your investment adviser, we have to act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide you. Here are some examples to help you understand what this means:

- Third-Party Payments: Persons providing investment advice on behalf of our firm are licensed as
 independent insurance agents. These persons will earn commission-based compensation for selling insurance
 products. Insurance commissions are separate and in addition to our advisory fees. This practice presents a
 conflict of interest because they have an incentive to recommend insurance products to you for the purpose of
 generating commissions rather than solely based on your needs.
- Third-Party Payments: Persons providing advice on behalf of our firm are registered representatives with a
 broker-dealer. These persons receive compensation in connection with the purchase and sale of securities or
 other investment products. Compensation earned by these persons is separate and in addition to our advisory
 fees. This practice presents a conflict of interest because they have an incentive to recommend investment
 products based on the compensation received rather than solely based on your needs.
